


NOT JUST BLACK & WHITE

The multi-hued diagram represents a game of Twister between two players; as you can see, in going from dot to dot they have gotten rather tangled together.

The letters to be inserted along each spiral path will spell out one sequence of words if read heading towards the center of the grid, and another sequence of words if read in the opposite direction; since there are two spiral paths, that gives a total of four word sequences. Clues 1A-1D clue the first words of those sequences, clues 2A-2D clue the second words, etc; however, within a group of four clues, it is up to you to determine which clued word goes with which sequence. (Answers to 1A and 1B have been entered into the grid to get you started.)

When the grid has been filled, you will be able to determine which of the two players made it to the winner's circle. If you read the letters on the blue dots followed by the letters on the green dots (each left to right and top to bottom), you will get a quotation describing the players' reaction to the colorful Twister mat beneath them. (Reading the letters on the yellow dots and the letters on the red dots will point you towards two items on the page that relate to the source of the quotation.)
